

Money can be shown in two forms. One has a dollar sign. The other has a cents symbol. Notice how they are the same in some ways and different in others.

The dollar sign one has a leading zero then a decimal. This is because 21 cents is less than a dollar. When we add, subtract, multiply, or divide money amounts we have to be careful to choose the right one so the decimal will be in the right place in the answer. It isn't hard. You just have to be sure you have the same type as the other number.

Here is \$5.30. Notice that it is using the dollar symbol. I have to use the version of 21 cents that also has the dollar symbol.
